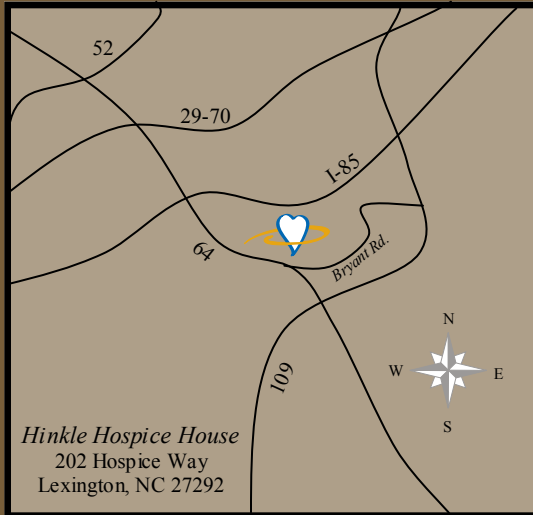


LOCATION MAP

The Henry Etta and Bruce Hinkle Hospice House is a twelve bed, inpatient facility offering a caring environment in a home-like setting where terminally-ill patients receive specialized medical care for their symptoms and pain management.



It is a place where family members and loved ones of all ages may spend time with the patient 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

WHEN IS INPATIENT CARE APPROPRIATE

Patients receive the same medical, emotional, spiritual and support services



provided in our Home Care Program. Inpatient care simply provides a setting that permits more intensive monitoring and rapid response to the unique challenges a patient is experiencing with their hospice diagnosis.

Inpatient care may be the best options when:

- the progression of a home care patient's illness becomes more than a caregiver can handle at home.
- there is a need for a medication or dosage change, and close monitoring is required.
- there is a need for respite care.

DESIGNED WITH PATIENTS AND FAMILIES IN MIND

To help patients and their families feel more at home, the Hinkle Hospice House was beautifully designed to meet the clinical needs of the patient while providing a home-like setting. The needs of family members were also considered and led to the inclusion of family rooms with kitchenettes, sun rooms and screen porches.

The facility also houses a meditation room, play areas for children, private meeting areas, laundry access and wireless internet. Outside



grounds were also carefully planned to allow for play areas, walking paths, floral gardens, fountains and future expansion of the facility.



MAKING A REFERRAL

Referring a patient to the Hinkle Hospice House can be made any time you determine they are in need of hospice care. A referral may be made by the patient, a family member, friend, spiritual counselor or doctor. Hospice of Davidson County staff are available to assess and evaluate a patient 24 hours a day, seven days a week.
