NHPCO is in collaboration with the Department of Veteran Affairs, community Hospices, and local Veteran Service Organizations (VSO’s). Our common goal is to provide the best possible care for veterans in the best possible manner, while honoring veterans’ preferences.

Hospice of Davidson County offers an opportunity for volunteer veterans to provide support to other veterans and their families at end-of-life.

A hospice volunteer curriculum for veterans is offered to provide education and meet the unique needs of veterans. The training includes education concerning Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD).

Hospice of Davidson County Veteran Volunteer Application and Training Process

Hospice volunteers are ambassadors in the community and homes of our patients. Therefore, qualifying criteria and processes are in place to ensure our patients receive the best care. Every volunteer must complete a volunteer application and interview with the Volunteer Manager.

Applicants are invited to participate in twelve hours of volunteer training, which is a volunteer requirement. These initial steps are followed by various verification processes.

Veterans who wish to provide specialized support to veteran patients at end-of-life will complete additional specific training.

All Applicants Must:

- Pass a Drug Test/Urine Analysis
- Allow for a Criminal Records Check, and Sex Offender Search
- Provide a Motor Vehicle Report

Documents Required:

- Proof of Auto Insurance and a Valid NC Driver’s License
- TB Skin Test

U.S. Veterans Facts

- More than 10% of Hospice of Davidson County patients served annually are veterans.
- In 2020, Hospice of Davidson County provided care to more than 117 veterans.
- There are more than 26 million veterans living in our country today.
- 25% of all deaths in the US are veterans.
- More than 1,8000 veterans die each day, on average (over 680,000 annually).
- The VA cares for only a small number of veterans, with only 33% of all veterans enrolled in a VA program and receiving benefits.
- At the end of life, 96% of Veterans die in their own community.
- Veterans are dying every day without quality end-of-life care, and Hospice of Davidson County wants to change that for our community veterans.
